# ABRAHAM AND ISAAC

Genesis 2

## ABRAHAM ASKED TO GIVE UP HIS FUTURE

In the first part of the story of Abraham, he is asked to leave behind his family and go to the place where God shows him. Now, we find him being asked to give up his *future* family at the place where God shows him.

Genesis 22

The Moriah Mountain range is in modern day Jerusalem, and the site of where Abraham took Isaac is where the Temple eventually is built. On that same range is one of the purported places that Christ was crucified.

Hebrews 11.17-19

### SUBSTITUTIONARY ATONEMENT

- Isaac: he is a "firstfruit" of the future Israel (which his son, Jacob, would even be renamed as), as he is the beginning of the multiplied offspring who are the people of Israel, with Abraham as their father. In this story, Isaac is a symbol of God's people, including us Gentiles who have been grafted into Israel through faith, who should be killed for their sin.
- **The Lamb**: this is a picture of Christ, who was *substituted* in place of Israel and became the sacrifice, provided by God Himself.

1 Thessalonians 5.9, 10 // 1 John 4.10 // Hebrews 6.13

It is God himself who in holy wrath needs to be propitiated, God himself who in holy love undertook to do the propitiating, and God himself who in the person of his Son died for the propitiation of our sins. Thus God took his own loving initiative to appease his own righteous anger by bearing it his own self in his own Son when he took our place and died for us. **– John Stott, the Cross of Christ**

## COMMUNITY GROUP HOMEWORK

Read <b>Genesis 22</b> . What stuck out to you the most or was the most impactful from the message on Sunday or from these verses?
What do you notice in the story that are common themes we have seen elsewhere, whether in previous stories in <b>Genesis</b> , or in future stories in the New Testament?
So far, we have seen that God is serious about sin, as well as mercifully serious about redeeming people from their sin. Why is it necessary for there to be a penalty for sin?
Why can't God just "look the other way" and forgive us?
Just like how it would be wrong for an earthly judge, parent, friend, police officer, teacher, or anyone else to "look the other way" when sin is committed, even more so, it would prove that God was not truly good (and therefore, not even God) if He simply looked away. Sin <i>must</i> be dealt with. How does this story give us a picture of this?
When the Jews read the Old Testament, the sparing of Isaac rings true in their hearts, a very real indication that God truly kept His promise and that they, the Jews, are alive only because God kept this promise and spared Isaac.
Read <b>Ephesians 2.11-22, Romans 2.28-29, 11.17-24.</b> What do these verses say about our place in regards to Israel?
Since Isaac is a "firstfruit" of the future Israel (the offspring promised to Abraham), how does Isaac's exoneration on the altar give us a very real picture of us being saved from death through Christ?
Read <b>Exodus 12.1-13.</b> This even is known as the Passover. What parallels do you see here, as well?
Now read <b>John 1.29-34.</b> Why is John the Baptist using this phrase to describe Jesus to the people of Israel?
Read <b>Revelation 5.1-14</b> , as well as <b>Genesis 3.15</b> and <b>Genesis 22.17</b> , <b>18</b> . How do you see these three Scriptures tie together the message of the Gospel as first mentioned in <b>3.15</b> , reiterated in <b>22.17</b> , <b>18</b> . & consummated in <b>Revelation 5.1-14?</b>
